<b>Aims of the course:</b> The course aims at providing students with basic knowledge of arbitration law and at enabling them to apply the acquired knowledge in practice. Critical approach to the existing legal framework is particularly emphasized and attention is given both to domestic and to foreign arbitral practice. Students should become familiar with the way in which arbitration proceedings unfold, with the advantages and shortcomings of such dispute resolution mechanism as well as with the key aspects which distinguish arbitration from litigation.			
<b>Course result:</b> The course should provide students with basic knowledge on the rules of arbitration law and the way in which these rules are applied.
