Requirements:			
Aims of the course: Acquiring knowledge and understanding of the creation, development and establishment of the basic principles and aims of the international law doctrine which regulate the area of human rights; understanding of basic conceptual basis of the doctrine and practice of human rights, with theoretical, international and legal solutions and some specificities of the human rights; acquiring general legal education and development of critical legal thinking; examination of the nature of law, legal doctrine and basic ideas, principles and institutions of human rights; understanding of the role of the legislature for the development of human rights; understanding of relationship between domestic and international law related to human rights; analyzing the influence of other factors to the law of human rights; enabling the use of comparative law methods and acquiring basic understanding of other legal systems from this area; understanding the European and other legal traditions from the field of human rights and harmonization of Serbian law with those legal systems.			
Course result: Vearing in mind the fact that human rights area is already being delt with in many other courses at the law faculty, this course aims to provide comprehensive udnerstadning of all the topics not dealt with in other courses which are relevant for the true understanding of the human rights law.			
Course content: Notion and subject matter of human rights; evolution of idea, understanding and legal norms from this field; human rights in domestic law; international human rights; protection of human rights in piece; protection of human rights in extraordinary circumstances (humanitarian law); sources of international law of human rights; implementation of hiuman rights; types of supervision; supervision by international organizations in establishing, implementing and protecting the human rights; sanctions for violations of human rights; basic human rights and freedoms; individual and collective rights; general terms of enjoyment of human rights; limitations of human rights.
