<b>Requirements:</b>			
<b>Aims of the course:</b> Course aims to enable students to acquire basic knowledge and understanding of the processes of creation, developments and establishment of the minority protection on universal and regional level, legal and philosophical support of recognition of collective rights, understanding of importance of these issues for multicultural communities, analyses of certain pertinent issues. The course aims to develop critical legal reasoning in this area and critical evaluation of the domestic legal system and its harmonization with the international norms from this field.			
<b>Course result:</b> Candidates should reach such a level of knowledge and skills which enable them to independently critically evaluate wide scope of legal issues from the field of minority rights.			
<b>Course content:</b> Historical development of minority rights in international public law; international acts of universal character which enable minority rights protection ; european legal framework for minority rights protection; legal-philosophical justification of minority rights; minority rights as individual and collective rights - legal and theoretical basis; case study; types of minority rights: linguistic, religious and symbolic rights; the right to political participation; the right to selfdetermination as minority right?; status of Roma in SEE and Serbia; minority rights in comparative constitutional law; minority rights in Serbia; minority rights and social unity; analyses of the practice of international supervision bodies in the field of minority protection; debate.
