Aims of the course: The aim of the course is to introduce the students with the concept of social change and the effects of social changes on legal norms.			
Course result: Students trained for independent study of social and legal changes.			
Course content: The course <i>Social Changes and Law</i> is composed of three parts. The first part focuses on the analysis of contemporary social theories and law. The second part of the course analyzes the concepts of social change, theoretical and methodological challenges in the study of social changes, as well as two selected areas of social changes that have far-reaching influence on the law and contemporary Serbian society: globalization and post-socialist transformation. The third part of the course is devoted to the independent research paper on the influence of the selected aspects of social changes on the creation and application of legal norms. Contemporary social theories and law (system theory, Habermas, Bourdieu, Fuko, neo-Marxists, feminist and Critical Legal Studies); Social change and law; The concept of social change; Theory and methodological challenges in the study of social change; Globalization and law; Post - socialist transition and law: Case study, social changes and law in the context of Post - socialist transformation: independent study research paper.
