Requirements: Submitting a preliminary application of a topic of doctoral dissertation in the scientific areas of Corporate law, Business Law or in other related scientific area.			
Aims of the course: The course aims to enable a candidate to broaden and deepen their knowledge in the fields of competition law and anti-monopoly policy, as well as to acquire special knowledge concerning relations between competition law, on the one hand, and intellectual property law, private international law and international human rights law, on the other hand.			
Course result: A candidate should acquire such a level of knowledge and skills which enables them to analyse issues of competition law independently and critically, as well as to conduct an original research independently.			
Course content: 1. Industrial standards and competition law; 2. Relations between competition law and industrial policy; 3. European Competition Network; 4. Relations between competition law and sectoral regulations (electronic communications law, energy law, etc.); 5. Competition law and legal relations with a foreign element; 6. Relations between legal protection of intellectual property and legal protection of competition; 7. Protection of human rights in the context of procedural competition law.
