<p>Aims of the Course:</p> <p>The aim of the course is to broaden the knowledge related to clarifying crimes and establishing facts. Without possession of specific criminalistics education, even the most advanced knowledge of normative legal disciplines cannot have effective results in fight against crime. Globalization brought new forms of crime with transnational elements - corruption, organized crime, economic crime, human trafficking, etc. At doctoral studies, special attention will be given to discovering and proving these crimes. In addition, the reform and adversarial model of criminal procedure require different methods of determining facts, which also requires a comparative approach to basic criminological settings. Case-law of the European Court of Human Rights also requires special attention of the competent authorities in detection of criminal offenses in the context of the fundamental rights of individuals and their protection. Therefore, it will be analyzed theoretical and practical aspect of two opposing tendencies and their alignment - the need to clarify and effectively combat crime from one hand, and the need to protect human rights on the other.</p>
