### Aims of the course:

Deepening knowledge and understanding of the creation, development and establishment of basic principles and aims of international law doctrine which regulates the area of human rights; Analysis of conceptual basis of the doctrine and practice of human rights, with theoretical, international and legal solutions and some specificities of human rights; Study of the nature of law, legal doctrine and fundamental ideas, principles and norms of international human rights law. In-depth examining of the role of legislature in the evolution of human rights. Study of the relationship between national law and international law with regard to human rights. Analyzing the influence of other factors on the law of human rights.

# **Course result:**

Candidates are to achieve the appropriate level of knowledge and skills which will enable them to individually and critically examine questions arising in the area of international human rights law and to independently conduct their own research.

## **Course content:**

Notion and nature of human rights; Evolution of human rights; Classification of fundamental human rights and freedoms; Sources of international human rights law; Implementation of the norms of international human rights law; Mechanisms for supervision of human rights within international organizations; Sanctions for violations of human rights; Fundamental principles of enjoyment of human rights; International protection of particular human rights (civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights, collective rights, minority rights and indigenous peoples' rights). Protection of human rights in particular circumstances and public emergencies.
