Requirements:			
Aims of the course: Gaining deeper knowledge in particular areas of certain extralegal scientific disciplines, such as: psychology, psychopathology, and psychiatry. These areas of knowledge can be of great importance in application of law by certain participants in the criminal procedure (primarily the judges). This is the basis of knowledge that allows a clearer and deeper insight into certain institutes of material law with legal contents that are enriched with concepts studied by aforementioned extralegal scientific disciplines.			
Course result: Utilizing the knowledge of certain extralegal scientific disciplines that give certainty and direction to certain participants in the criminal procedure while interpreting and applying certain institutes of Criminal law.			
Course content: Concept and subject of Legal psychology; System and tasks of Legal psychology; Legal psychology in the narrow sense – the Psychology of criminal procedure; the Psychology of material Criminal law; the judico-psychological aspect of culpability, the judico-psychological aspect of incompetence and decreased competence; the judico-psychological aspect of <i>Actio libera in causa</i> ; the judico-psychological aspect of will, intent, incentive and hatred.
