Aims of the course: The aim of this course is to provide in-depth knowledge about aims and legal instruments of protection against social risk in national, comparative and international law, while training for independent research in the field of social security law.			
Course result: The course is oriented towards gaining in-depth knowledge of main concepts, principles and institutes of social security law, training students for: critical reflection on the method of administrative and financial organization and legal regulation of protection against social risks; analysis and assessment of the current challenges and reforms of the system of protection against social risks; understanding social security law as an instrument for establishing and preserving social cohesion.			
Course content: The contents of the course include the following units: The concept and the subject of the social security law; Need for social security; Social risk; Origin and development of protection against social risk; Basic comparative law models and concepts of protection against social risks; The right to social security; Social legal relationship; Social benefits; Sources of social security law; Financial and administrative organization of social security systems; Social insurance; Contractual regimes for protection against social risks; The relationship between the public and the private sector in performing the activity of protection against social risks; Social housing; Challenges and reforms of social security system; Social security of migrants.
