Aims of the course: Acquiring knowledge and understanding the creation, development and establishment of basic principles and aims of international law doctrine which regulates the area of human rights; understanding conceptual basis of the doctrine and human rights practice, with theoretical, international and legal solutions and certain specificities of human rights; acquiring general legal education and development of critical legal reasoning; examination of the nature of law, legal doctrine and basic ideas, principles and institutions of international human rights law; understanding the role of the legislature in the development of human rights; understanding relationship between domestic and international law related to human rights; analyzing the influence of other factors on human rights law; enabling the use of comparative law methods and acquiring advanced understanding of other legal systems in this area; understanding the European and other legal traditions in the field of human rights and harmonization of Serbian law with aforementioned legal systems.

Course result: Students should acquire the level of knowledge and skills sufficient for independent critical analysis of a wide spectrum of issues within human rights and for independent original research with the use of adequate litterature and methodology.

Course content: Profound analysis and study of: Notion and subject matter of human rights; evolution of human rights, understanding legal norms in the field of human rights; human rights in domestic law; international human rights; protection of human rights in extraordinary circumstances (humanitarian law); sources of international human rights law; implementation of human rights; types of supervision; supervision by international organizations in establishing, implementing and protecting human rights; sanctions for violations of human rights; fundamental human rights and freedoms; individual and collective rights; general terms of enjoyment of human rights; limitations of human rights.
