Aims of the course:

The course encompasses the in-depth study of international organizations. Students are to be motivated to examine the international legal personality of international organizations and their characteristics. The aim is to analyze the foundation of the United Nations, their aims and principles, as well as their organs and their mutual relationship, competences and functioning in concrete cases.

Course result:

The candidate has to achieve the appropriate level of knowledge and skills which will enable her/him to individually and critically examine a wide range of questions arising from the area of international organizations and to individually conduct its own original research.

Course content:

Notion, basic characteristics and classifications of international organizations; International legal personality of international organizations; Basis of competences and obligations of international organizations; Contractual capacity of international organizations; Responsibility/Liability of international organizations; Privileges and immunities of international organizations; Membership to international organizations; Permanent missions of states to international organizations; Organizational structure of international organizations; Financing and expenditures of international organizations; Legal nature of international organizations decisions; Status of international officers; Legal framework of cooperation between international organizations, member states and observer states; Achieving peace via international organizing and integration of states; Universal international organizations and regional international organizations.
