Course result: Acquiring knowledge and skills for independent research in legal history

Course content: Candidates will be faced specific demands considering research of primary and secondary legal and historical sources by use of specific methods and techniques. Approach to primary sources comprehends skill to proper reading, undesrtanding and interpretation of legal texts and archive material. Accordint to their place in historical and social context, they should be able to classify and evaluate sources according to their reliability, and develope skill to interpret sources individualy and without prejudices.

Use of secondary sources encompases use of relevant literature on the topic of research; gathering of facts relevant for the topic, particularly those relevant for a wider beckground of the events. Skill of proper interprtation of historical events is particularly stressed. Acquiring knowledge in argumentation, debating and evaluation of historical events.
