Aims of the Course: Understand methods and tools for detecting, establishing and verifying facts in order to effectively detect, clarify and prove criminal offenses, as well as practical application of acquired knowledge.			
Course result: At the end of this course students should be able to work within the competent institutions dealing with detection and clarification of criminal offenses.			
Course content: Criminalistics, as a discipline that develops knowledge of facts, its disclosure, verification and subordination to legal norms, enables effective detection, clarification and proof of criminal offenses. In this regard, special attention is devoted to criminal activities such as insights, reconstruction, search, how to conduct informative interviews with citizens, etc., as well as analysis of the traces of the criminal offense. Various criminalistics expertise, identification methods, statement of witnesses as a personal means of proof are analyzed. A special part of the course is dedicated to the discovery, clarification and proof of certain crimes such as murder, rape, abduction, drug abuse, commercial crime, computer crime, and so on. Course content: Introduction to criminalistics; Methods of finding out a criminal offense; Criminalistics acts; Detection and clarification of certain criminal offenses;
