Aims of the course: The aim of the course is to provide basic comprehension of international relations and to point out particular historical constants which explain the behavior of States - as principal subjects of international relations within the international community. Also, its aim is to underline the ideological matrix and discourses on international relations whose purpose is to false the reality. The specificity of this discipline is reflected through the questions of war and peace, and consequently this area is given a particular attention.			
Course result: The candidate has to acquire the appropriate level of knowledge and skills which will enable him to individually and critically examine a wide range of questions raising in the area of international relations and to judge properly on international reality.			
Course content: Epistemological framework of the science of international relations and theoretical approach of international relations; Geopolitical analysis of international relations; History, structures and processes of international systems; Subjects of international relations; History of international relations from 1815 to after-Cold War period; Role of international law in international relations; Foreign policy; Collective security; Use of force in international relations; Role of ideology in international relations; Case studies - FRY 1999., Iraq 2003.
