Aims of the course:

The aim of this course is to offer the students to acquire basic knowledge in the field of diplomatic and consular law. Through teaching of various related topics included in this program, the main focus of the course is on the normative analyses of the relevant principles as well as the application in practical terms observing the most notable cases of the International Courte of Justice and the comparative practices of states, with a view of the relevant practice of the diplomatic service of the Republic of Serbia.

Course result: The student should be able to acquire the level of knowledge and skill adequate for independent critical analyses of a wide spectrum of issues within the scope of the Diplomatic and Consular Law research and study.

Course content: Diplomatic History, the Development of Diplomatic Law, the Theory of Diplomatic Law, International Practice, the Study of Relevant Conventions, the Formal Limitation to contractual ability in accordance with International Law, Bodies representing the state; diplomatic representation of the state; the establishment of diplomatic relations, the members of the diplomatic staff, the member s of the administrative and technical staff, the functions of a diplomatic mission, the status of the premises of the mission,; the privileges and the immunity of a diplomatic agent, the legale grounds for privileges and immunity, the end of a diplomatic mission, special missions, consules, the history of consulastes, the definition and types of consules, the functions of a consule, the privileges and immunity of a consulate, the difference between a diplomatic mission and a consulate, multilateral representation, the Conventions on representation of States in their Relations with International Organizations of Universal Character, permanent missions at international organizations, the representation of states through the services of another state, the state institutions held responsible for its actions under International Law, the staff of international organization, the privileges and the immunity of international organizations and its staff, the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, UN experts.
