Aims of the course: The main goal of Law of autonomy authorities is to guide students of academic studies into multidisciplinary way of thinking when comes to the modern issues of Law of autonomy authorities, to expend their knowledge, as well as to provide them with critical legal thinking that will develop a sense of recognition of true social values, and in the practical work and life to increase the sense of professional responsibility that is always expected or required by lawyers.

Autonomous right to individual and collective identity; 12. The ways of gaining collective rights; 13. Social and political development of the latest understanding of "self"; 14. Consequences of adoption and practical application of learning about autonomous identity, especially in light of the fundamental change in social and state relations that lead to the creation of the so-called "world country".
